Why do families choose the optional program?

- The large school environment is reduced to a small, stable community.
- Teachers, students and parents share a common educational philosophy.
- Parents are welcome in the classrooms and are expected to participate in the program.
- Individual needs are met within a group context.
- Discipline problems are minimized due to strong parental involvement.
- Active participation is required so that students are active learners.
- Multi-graded, cross optional activities give opportunities for children to experience a variety of social relationships and cooperative activities.
- Two years with the same teacher reduces "new class stress," and allows for smoother transitions for both parents and children.

- Long-term relationships allow teachers to develop strategies for individual student needs.
- The youngling/elder relationship allows all children to experience leadership roles.
- Multi-graded classrooms allow for a greater range of skills and abilities.
- The stable classroom community is a foundation for long-term friendships among children and families.
- "Grading" is avoided so that each child's progress is viewed individually.
- The teachers are excellent, constantly striving toward new growth and understanding.
- Academic standards are high.
- Teachers are willing to problem-solve with children and parents.
